- July 2018: City Council Provided Direction on Concept Scenarios






### Purpose of the Plan

Develop concepts that help:

- Improve **safety** and reduce crashes
- Increase <u>accessibility</u> and <u>connectivity</u> with <u>land uses</u>
- Support <u>existing businesses</u> and <u>future</u>
   <u>growth</u>
- Promote active living by <u>improving access</u> to trails

Quality of Life & Economic Benefits
Difficult Intersections & Lack of Landscaping





Drew Street: Osceola Avenue to Myrtle Avenue






## Drew Street: Osceola Avenue to Myrtle Avenue Preferred




## Drew Street: Myrtle Avenue to Keene Road Preferred






### **Example: Road Diet**



#### **Before**


A four-lane undivided road operating as a de facto three-lane cross section.

A Road Diet providing a two-way left-turn lane.










### **Drew Street & Myrtle Avenue**

- 1. Left turn lane
- 2. Modified sidewalk
- 3. New curb
- 4. Landscaped medians



#### **Drew Street & Corona Avenue**







- 1. Landscaped medians
- 2. Crosswalk barrier medians



#### **Drew Street & Old Coachman Road**





- 1. No right turn on red
- 2. Trail signage improvements
- 3. Widened stamped high emphasis crosswalk
- 4. Decrease turn radii & ADA ramp improvements
