### RALLYING AROUND THE FLORIDA GULF COAST HOPE SPOT

With funding from the Tampa Bay Estuary Program, Blue-Green Connections initiated the "Rallying Around the Florida Gulf Coast Hope Spot" project. This project supported student-developed educational materials that emphasize the importance of these dynamic ecosystems and document how individuals can protect them. The materials will be made available to educators around the region and will be on display at local aquariums, which draw large numbers of students from the Tampa Bay area.

<u>Hope spots</u> are economically important locations that are critical to ocean health. These regions have unique ecological features that harbor rare or threatened species and act as spawning or nursery grounds for important fisheries and wildlife.

Projects like these are funded through sales of the Tampa Bay Estuary Specialty License Plate, aka the "Tarpon Tag."
